## Question on Notice No. 709 Asked on 10 May 2006

MR SEENEY asked the Minister for Health (MR ROBERTSON)—

## QUESTION:

How many doctors including visiting medical officers (reported separately) have resigned from Queensland Health hospitals since the mini-Budget was delivered in October 2005?

## ANSWER:

During the period since the mini-budget was delivered, 782 doctors commenced work at Queensland public hospitals. 444 medical staff or 9% of doctors working for Queensland Health resigned for a variety of reasons.

As I have advised previously, terminations reported are due to numerous reasons including employees who have resigned, whose contract or period of training has ended, who have transferred to another Queensland Health district, or been dismissed.

The table below identifies the following data for the period from October 2005 to April 2006:

- statewide medical resignations by level/classification;
- total headcounts by level/classification; and
- the percentage of resignations by total headcount, by level/classification (for further clarity).
