MR STEPHEN BENNETT asked the Minister for Child Safety, Youth and Women and Minister for the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence (HON D FARMER)—

QUESTION

Will the Minister advise the average (a) case load of a Child Safety Officer, (b) duration of tenure of a Child Safety Officer and (c) length of time to fill a vacant Child Safety Officer role?

ANSWER

Despite a continuing increase in the number of children subject to ongoing intervention, the average case load of a Queensland child safety officer is reducing.

This is directly as a result of the Palaszczuk Government's commitment to recruit more child safety staff. Child safety staffing has increased by 458 full-time equivalent staff over three years from 2016-17.

- a) The average case load of a Child Safety Officer is 17.4. This is an improvement of 1.7 from levels recorded in March 2015 (19.1), and 1.2 from March 2017 (18.6).
- b) The department's Child Safety Officer average tenure is five years.
- c) The Department of Child Safety, Youth and Women (DCSYW) uses a centralised recruitment model and a 'continuous applicant pool' to recruit entry-level Child Safety Officers on an ongoing basis statewide.

A job offer from date of application to the 'continuous applicant pool' to appointment may vary from a few weeks to more than 12 months.

To obtain the exact length of time to fill a position is quite difficult as there are several factors to take into consideration when appointing a Child Safety Officer, such as, the location of the position and how many suitable applicants there are in the pool at the time of the vacancy.
