QUESTION:

With reference to each of the following qconnect/TransLink service areas—

Will the Minister provide a breakdown of the number of wheelchair accessible and non wheelchair accessible buses that are used to deliver qconnect/TransLink services (a) South East Queensland, (b) Cairns, (c) Mackay, (d) Toowoomba, (e) Townsville, (f) Bundaberg, (g) Gladstone, (h) Gympie, (i) Hervey Bay, (j) Rockhampton, (k) Sunshine Coast Hinterland and (I) Warwick?

ANSWER:

I thank the Member for Chatsworth for the question.

The Palaszczuk Government is committed to removing barriers to passenger transport for people with disability. An accessible passenger transport network provides opportunities for people with disability to independently travel to essential services, employment, education and social activities.

The table below provides a breakdown of the number of wheelchair accessible and non-wheelchair accessible buses that are used to deliver qconnect/TransLink services.
