MS F SIMPSON ASKED MINISTER FOR TRANSPORT AND MAIN ROADS (HON M BAILEY)—

QUESTION:

Will the Minister advise for each financial year between 2015–16 to 2021–22, (a) both the total number of Camera Detected Offence Program fines issued by the department and (b) the number of these that were referred to SPER due to non-payment?

ANSWER:

I thank the Member for Maroochydore for the question.

The Camera Detected Offence Program (CDOP) is an important component of Queensland's approach to tackling road trauma and meeting the state's commitments of a 50 per cent reduction in fatalities, and 30 per cent reduction in serious injuries, by 2031.

CDOP infringement notices issued over the past seven financial years are listed in the table below.

The number of camera detected offences that were referred to State Penalty and Enforcement Registry due to non-payment are listed in the table below.

All excess revenue generated by CDOP is required under legislation to be reinvested into road safety initiatives. This includes road safety education and awareness programs—enabling practices and behaviours that improve road safety, road accident injury rehabilitation programs for persons that have been injured in a crash, and fund infrastructure and related technologies to improve the safety of state-controlled roads.
