#### Asked on 31 March 2022

MS R BATES ASKED THE MINISTER FOR HEALTH AND AMBULANCE SERVICES (HON Y D'ATH)—

## QUESTION

With reference to the Minister's statement in the House on 21 April 2021 that, 'our health system is currently providing beds to almost 600 people who should be in disability or aged-care accommodation' and repeated in the media on 27 March 2022—

Will the Minister provide the following (a) a list of each Queensland Health facility where these patients are located and (b) the number of patients from this cohort at each facility?

#### **ANSWER**

Long-stay patients are inpatients that are medically ready for discharge but are awaiting appropriate supports to transition to the community. Queensland Health conducts a statewide long-stay patient census on a quarterly basis. Long-stay data collections are point-in-time snapshots. The number of long-stay patients is subject to change daily as long-stay patients transition to the community and other patients become long-stay.

The statement made in the Legislative Assembly on 21 April 2021 that, 'our health system is currently providing beds to almost 600 people who should be in disability or aged-care accommodation', referred to data as at the 24 February 2021 census.

To compare annual point-in-time data, I have been advised that as at 24 February 2021, there were a total of 575 long-stay patients across Queensland Health settings. In the following year, as at 23 February 2022, there were 512 long-stay patients across Queensland Health settings. I am further advised that as patients do transfer across different hospital settings the most appropriate data is by Hospital and Health Service (HHS), see below:

The decline in total long-stay patients from February 2021 to February 2022 is a testament to Queensland Health's significant workforce effort and investment to support long-stay patients who no longer require medical care to be discharged into the community for a more appropriate living arrangements that support their needs and wellbeing.

Queensland hospitals continue to see unprecedented acute care demand and solutions to addressing long stay patient issues. Queensland Health continues to advocate to the Commonwealth for long term, sustainable, and fit-for-purpose solutions to reduce the volume and length of stay for long-stay patients that are medically ready for discharge.
