## Asked on 22 June 2022

**MR S ANDREW** asked the Minister for Health and Minister for Ambulance Services (HON Y D'ATH)—

## QUESTION

Will the Minister advise from 2018 to 2022 (reported separately by year) (a) how many deaths were registered in Queensland for people aged 75 or over and (b) how many of those deaths occurred whilst the person was 'in care'?

## **ANSWER**

a) The registration of deaths is the responsibility of the Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages, within the Department of Justice and Attorney-General. I encourage the Member to direct questions relating to deaths registered in Queensland to the Attorney-General and Minister for Justice, Minister for Women and Minister for the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence who has portfolio responsibility for the Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages.
