Question on Notice No. 760 Asked on 16 August 2022

MR S O'CONNOR ASKED THE MINISTER FOR TOURISM, INNOVATION AND SPORT AND MINISTER ASSISTING THE PREMIER ON OLYMPICS AND PARALYMPICS SPORT AND ENGAGEMENT (HON S HINCHLIFFE) —

QUESTION:

With reference to Estimates hearings, the Director-General confirmed \$331.5m of the \$755m funding under the Advance Queensland banner has been or is currently being administered and expended by the Innovation Department—

Will the Minister provide a full breakdown of how this funding has been allocated and a breakdown of the remaining funding, including the departments involved in administering it and the projects it has supported?

ANSWER:

Advance Queensland (AQ) is the Palaszczuk Government's future vision for and investment in a strong Queensland economy. This significant innovation initiative is supporting programs and activities that drive innovation, build on our natural advantages, and help raise our profile as an attractive investment destination.

During the 2022 Estimates hearing the Director-General, Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport (DTIS) incorrectly advised the Economics and Governance Committee (EGC) that out of a total of the \$320.5 million there was a total of \$331.5 million financially committed for the DTIS innovation budget.

On 5 August 2022, the Minister for Tourism, Innovation and Sport and Minister Assisting the Premier on Olympics and Paralympics Sport and Engagement wrote to the EGC to clarify that the correct figure was \$311.5 million out of \$320.5 million.

Since its conception in 2015, AQ has always been a suite of programs and activities which spans multiple departments and agencies across government with DTIS as the lead coordinating agency. The Government has never shied away from this, in fact we embrace it - because innovation is not a limited field, it exists across Government agencies and the economy.

As an example, if there is a biomedical opportunity it may be best placed for it to be run by Queensland Health and similarly if it is an emerging priority industry it may be best for it to sit with the Department of State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning.
