# Asked on 12 September 2023

MR B MICKELBERG ASKED MINISTER FOR EDUCATION, MINISTER FOR INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS AND MINISTER FOR RACING (HON G GRACE)

### QUESTION:

Will the Minister advise for each financial year from 2020-21 to 2022-23 (a) the current number of state high schools delivering a VET program, (b) the number of participating students and (c) the number of completed qualifications (detailed separately by SA4 area)?

#### ANSWER:

Queensland state schools have a strong history of embracing and offering VET pathways to students and are committed to ensuring the delivery of quality programs for all students.

The data below represents the number of state high school campuses with students undertaking a VET program, delivered by a school registered training organisation (RTO) or an external RTO, such as TAFE Queensland or a private provider, the number of students at these schools participating in VET, and the number of completed qualifications by SA4 area, for the period requested.

Note, data is provided by calendar year given it is not collected by financial years. Data for 2023 will be available following certification on 15 December 2023. Numbers are based on data provided by the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority.

In relation to part (a), the number of state high school campuses that have students participating in VET were 291 in 2020; 307 in 2021; and 316 in 2022.

In relation to part (b), the number of state high school students participating in VET were 52,850 in 2020; 64,633 in 2021; and 52,508\* in 2022.

\*In 2022, the qualification FSK20113 - Certificate II in Skills for Work and Vocational Pathways was superseded and no longer recognised as contributing to the literacy and numeracy standard for the award of a Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE). Many schools offered that qualification for students to meet the literacy and numeracy requirements for the QCE resulting in a smaller number of students doing and completing VET courses in 2022.
