MS R BATES ASKED MINISTER FOR HEALTH, MENTAL HEALTH AND AMBULANCE SERVICES AND MINISTER FOR WOMEN (HON S FENTIMAN)—

QUESTION

With reference to patients waiting for an initial service event in a Specialist Outpatient Clinic—

Will the Minister advise (reported separately by the 29 specialties listed on the Queensland Reporting Hospitals website) as at 30 September 2023 (a) the total number of patients waiting for an initial service event in a Specialist Outpatient Clinic and (b) the number of patients who have not been seen within the clinically recommended time waiting for an initial service event in a Specialist Outpatient Clinic?

ANSWER

Queensland's health system, like health systems across the world, is experiencing a range of pressures, including a global workforce shortage and rapid population growth leading to increased demand.

Demand for specialist outpatient appointments has increased by nearly 50 per cent since 2016, with approximately 685,000 referrals received in the 2022-23 financial year alone.

That growth has continued into this financial year, with referrals increasing by nine per cent compared to the same time last year.

And service delivery is also increasing, with 676,435 appointments delivered in the last financial year.

In very promising news for Queenslanders, I am advised that Queensland Health has delivered 12.4 per cent more specialist outpatient appointments than at this time last year, and approximately 19 per cent above pre-COVID levels.

This progress shows that our investments are working. For example, in September, I announced that we would be investing \$224 million to deliver 50,000 additional elective surgeries and specialist outpatients this financial year.

I am advised that the list below outlines the total number of patients waiting for an initial service event at a specialist outpatient clinic, and the total number of patients who have not been seen within the clinically recommended timeframes (long waits).

This data is as at 1 October 2023, and includes patients who were not ready for care as at the census date.
