Question on Notice No. 961 Asked on 23 August 2023

MR N DAMETTO ASKED MINISTER FOR POLICE AND CORRECTIVE SERVICES AND MINISTER FOR FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES (HON M RYAN)—

QUESTION:

With reference to Queensland juvenile offenders— Will the Minister advise (reported separately by year) (a) how many juvenile offenders were charged with the offence of unlawful use of a motor vehicle for the past ten years and (b) how many of those offenders charged had a prior conviction recorded and/or were sentenced to a period of detention?

ANSWER:

I am advised by the Queensland Police Service (QPS) that:

- (a) the number of juvenile offenders charged with the offence of unlawful use of a motor vehicle for the past ten calendar years is as follows:
 - In 2013, there were 1,333 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2014, there were 1,184 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2015, there were 1,108 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2016, there were 1,227 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2017, there were 1,468 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2018, there were 1,627 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2019, there were 1,502 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2020, there were 1,812 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2021, there were 1,952 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.
 - In 2022, there were 2,163 juveniles charged with unlawful use of motor vehicle offences.

Notes:

- 1. This data is preliminary and may be subject to change.
- 2. Data relates to sections 408A and 398.12 of the Criminal Code.
- 3. Juveniles refer to persons aged between 10 and 17 years as at the date of charge.
- 4. Persons charged represents a unique offender count. A person with multiple charges will be counted once in the breakdown.
- (b) I am further advised that conviction and sentencing data is held and most accurately reported by other Queensland Government departments. As such, I suggest that the member direct this portion of the question to the relevant Ministers.
